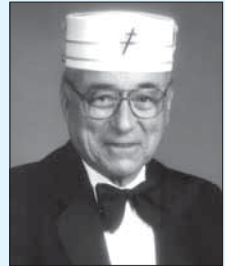

The apron is of yellow satin, with crimson and gold, and with a sword and Tetractys (of the Tetragrammaton) on it. The jewel is a heptagon (*seven sided*) of silver and gold, with crossed swords on a balance on the obverse, and a lamb on the book of seven seals on the reverse. The jewel is hung from a double order -- one black (left to right), representing good versus evil. A gold coronet is also presented.

A report from SPG Solar, the company that we purchased the system from and who monitors it on a daily basis indicates that during 2009 our Usage was up by 30%. I am sure this is due to the “Long Class Schedule” for January through May. Our Solar production is up by 7.6% and our savings for 2009 was \$11,428.00. This means that without our Solar system our electrical costs would have been approximately \$15,000.00. Our “Tru-up” cost was in the neighborhood of \$3,500.00 or the cost of electricity that we used over and above the amount we produced. A Brief Overview Of The Southern Jurisdiction's Origins And Its Ritual Development The Origins Of Scottish Rite

(Con't-2)

The following year, Francken returned to Jamaica, and by 1780 Hays immigrated to Newport, Rhode Island. In 1781, Hays traveled to Philadelphia where he met with eight Brethren whom he appointed Deputy Inspectors General over given States, with the exception of Samuel Myers who presided over the Leeward Islands. Barend Moses Spitzer, a Deputy Inspector General, Lived in Charleston from 1770 to 1781 and moved to Philadelphia where he was appointed Deputy for Georgia and, after traveling briefly abroad, returned to Charleston by 1788. On April 2, 1795, Spitzer appointed the Irish-born John Mitchell, then living in Charleston, a Deputy Inspector General.

On May 24, 1801 Mitchell created the Reverend Frederick Dalcho (a Prussian born in London) a Deputy Inspector General. And one week later "The Supreme Council of the 33^d Degree for the United States of America, was opened...agreeably to the Grand Constitutions" with Mitchell and Dalcho presiding. This Body is often referred to as the Supreme Council at Charleston and exists today as the Supreme Council, 33^o, Southern Jurisdiction. As the premiere Supreme Council, it is sometimes referred to as the "Mother Council of the world." This is the Body we belong to.

The traditional authority of the Supreme Council, as cited in its first official publication, the Circular throughout the hemispheres (1802), stems from the Constitutions of 1786, which were allegedly ratified by Frederick II, King of Prussia. Like Morin's Constitutions and Regulations of 1762, they are viewed as traditional rather than historical documents.

THE EARLY SCOTTISH RITE DEGREES, 1801-1845

The above-mentioned Circular was the first document to provide the Degree structure of the Rite. It is noted that the primitive grade structure aggregated and omitted some Degrees of the Scottish Rite as we know it today. It is also important to note that the Supreme Council originally only claimed authority over the Degrees above the Sixteenth Degree, Prince of Jerusalem. For the most part the Degrees were simply translations of those in Morin's Order of the Royal Secret. The origin of each of the "new" Degrees may not be known; however, it is believed the majority existed in rudimentary form in France. The Twenty-seventh Degree, Commander of the Temple, was a detached Degree, and was conferred by Louise Claude Henri de Moutmain in Charleston, south Carolina, from 1798 to 1802. Brother de Montmain conferred it upon Count Alexandre Francoise Auguste de Grasse in 1801, and it is

believed he introduced it into the Supreme Council system. Other Degrees came years later. The Thirty-First Degree, "Grand Inquiring Commander," was not introduced until after 1804.

Masonic History

Proven History: Pre 1700

So much for legend, what about the facts? It is acknowledged that the Regius Manuscript held in the British Museum is the oldest genuine record of Masonic relevance and was written in 1390. Its author was probably a priest and this MS takes the form of an historical and instructional poem. Interestingly, the phrase “**So Mote it be**” is first quoted from this text. Next, it is important to consider the Cooke Manuscript (also in the British Museum) written by a Speculative mason in 1450. This is an important document because many current Masonic usages (e.g. the Book of Constitutions written by Dr. Anderson in 1723) have obviously borrowed heavily from its content, which includes reference to the seven Liberal Arts and Sciences and the building of Solomon’s Temple. There are approximately 100 manuscripts, collectively known as the Old Charges, grouped together in four families held by various museums worldwide.

Next, we know that the London Company of Freemasons were granted Arms in 1473 and their coat included three castles and compasses and were incorporated within Metropolitan Grand Lodge of London’s arms upon the inauguration not so very long ago in 2003.

In 1583, a William Schaw was appointed by King James VI (later James I of England) as Master of the Work and Warden General. In 1598 he issued the first of the now famous Schaw Statutes which set out the duties its members owed to their Lodge. It also imposed penalties for unsatisfactory work and prohibited work with unqualified masons. Such was the profound significance of these statutes that they are found transcribed into the Minute book of Aitcheson Haven lodge, an ordinary operative Scottish lodge which has minutes going back to 9 January 1599.

More importantly for Freemasons today, Schaw drew up a second Statute in 1599. The importance of this document lies in the fact that it makes the first veiled reference to the existence of esoteric knowledge within the craft of stone masonry. It also reveals that The Mother Lodge of Scotland, Lodge Kilwinning No. 0 existed at that time. His regulations required all lodges to keep written records, meet at specific times and test members in the Art of Memory. As a consequence he is regarded by some as the founder of modern Freemasonry as we know it today.
